It was wonderful to welcome Mrs Jeffery, Mrs Downes and Mrs Humphries as well as all the governors who were able to come along and watch the children. Lastly I would like to thank all the parents, carers, families and friends who supported our children, it was wonderful to see so many of you.

Bad Weather

This morning it was necessary to change the usual routine because of the adverse weather conditions. The arrangements appear to have worked well and parents/carers seemed to have appreciated the staggered start. I would like to reassure you that when we delay the start of the day because of extreme weather, your child will not be marked as late if they arrive before the specified *delayed* start time.

As the weather becomes increasingly uncertain it is important that we prepare just in case we need to delay the start of the day again or even close the school. It is very important that we can contact you. We would normally share information in four ways:

- 1. via the local authority who then publish information on their website;
- 2. via the BBC Sheffield and Hallam FM radio stations who then make announcements live on air and put information on their website;
- 3. via a text; and
- 4. via an email which will include more details than can be included in a text.

It is therefore very important that our records are current. So, if you have changed your mobile telephone number or email address recently, I would be grateful if you would inform school immediately, so that our records can be updated. That way we can ensure that you will receive all necessary updates in the future.

Capital Funding

As you know I have been developing a new School Improvement Plan to address a range of key issues. In the future it is my intention to involve parents and carers in this process. A key focus has to be addressing the poor state of certain areas of our school. Earlier in the term I met with the Diocesan Property Manager and together we reviewed the site and identified a number of key areas which require attention. Following this meeting I applied for a significant capital grant to start redevelopments. Last week the governors were informed by the Diocese that our school has been awarded £150k to start the renewal process. Clearly it is important that we make this money work hard for us. To ensure that this happens, the Governors and I are looking at the possibility of working with a highly regarded firm of chartered surveyors and architects and to possibly develop a long-term partnership with them to redevelop and maintain our physical environment in a systematic way, just like many other schools across the diocese already do.

In identifying key areas for development I have listened carefully to the views of colleagues and our young people, and I appreciate that the state of our toilets is, for example, a big issue for many. Let me assure you that their redevelopment is on the Building Development Plan along with a number of other key things.

The Diocese has already agreed to project manage the reopening of the old pedestrian entrance in order to remove the need to use the parish car park. I will provide you with further information in due course.

PTFA

I would like to remind you that our next PTFA meeting will be on Wednesday 19th December 2012 straight after school in Mr Smith's classroom. If you would like to attend, your children will be supervised in Miss Kipling's classroom next door. The aim of the meeting is to elect a committee to begin the important process of registering our brand new PTFA as a charity. It would be great if we could get a really good turn out for this important meeting. Thank you.

New School Logo

A letter has been sent home to each family inviting you to vote on a new school logo. As a community we will be revisiting our vision and values in the coming months. This important process will involve my colleagues, the governors, parents and carers and of course our amazing children. The timing coincides with our plans to convert to voluntary academy status later in the academic year. Our identity as a school community, with a vision rooted in the Gospel values, is very important. Adopting a new logo which better reflects our Catholic identity and possibly our links to our patron saint, St John Fisher, would be a key part of this process. Attached to the letter are the fifteen designs and a brief explanation of each to help you make your decision.

Though the change of logo on the uniform will come into force from September 2013, your child(ren) can continue to wear the current uniform (with the existing logo) until you are ready to replace it. There will be no expectation that you will stop using perfectly good uniform simply because it has the previous logo on it.
