Collective Worship

Ash Wednesday Community Mass

Next Wednesday is Ash Wednesday. Fr Paul will celebrate Mass and our liturgy will be led by the young people of Y5. Everyone is invited. During our Mass those who wish to will have their foreheads marked with a cross of ashes. This is a sign of saying sorry to God for our sins (penitence) and acknowledging our own mortality. The ashes are made from the burnt palm crosses from Palm Sunday of the previous year.



Ash Wednesday also marks the official start of Lent. Lent is a special and holy time. It lasts 40 days and 40 nights and is a special time when Christians prepare for the greatest and most important of all Christian Feasts, Easter.

Fastina

Lent is a time of giving things up. For Christians, it is one way to remember the time when Jesus fasted in the desert and is a test of self-discipline. Christians choose not to eat certain foods in Lent. Some fast totally on certain days; some give up meat and fish; some might decide not to snack between meals and/or give up something they really enjoy such as biscuits, crisps, cakes or chocolate as a token gesture.

Shrove Tuesday

The day before Lent starts is called Shrove Tuesday. This is sometimes also called Pancake Day. Traditionally this was the last chance to use up the foods Christians would not be eating during Lent.

Lenten Class Liturgies

Starting from Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, there will be class liturgies from just after 3.00pm on the following days:

Tuesdays (Years 3 and 4)
Wednesdays (FS2, Years 5 and 6)
Thursdays (Years 1 and 2)

As in previous years and with our Advent class liturgies parents/carers/friends are asked to book first with the School Office staff and then arrive at 3.00pm ready to go to class.

Good Shepherd Lenten Appeal

Mrs Barrett is busy organising our annual fundraising event to support the Bishop's annual 'Good Shepherd' appeal which traditionally supports the vital work of the small Diocesan charities and support services. These help the people of Hallam Diocese which covers South Yorkshire and parts of North Derbyshire and North Nottinghamshire. She is planning reintroduce last year's popular 'Penny War'.

During Lent we will be collecting for one of our House charities, The Good Shepherd Appeal. During the penny war we will be collecting pennies and two-pennies. These can be placed in a class collecting tins at the beginning of the school day. Each penny is worth one point and each two-pence are worth two points.







Silver coins can be used to sabotage another class' total. Any Silver coins deposited into another class tin will reduce the amount points in that tin. So 5p will reduce the total by 5 points, 10p by 10 points etc. The tins will be placed in the school hall at lunchtime for the children to add their silver coins if they have any. At the end of Holy Week the counting tins will be opened and the pennies counted. Deductions resulting from silver coins will also be made. The class collecting the most will receive a 'Golden Time'. It begins on Ash Wednesday.

Weekly Liturgy of the Word

Thank you to the staff and young people of FS2 for leading this week's liturgy, so ably supported by their fantastic Y4 buddies. There is no liturgy for the next two week because of Ash Wednesday Mass next week and Assessment Point 3 the week after. Our next 'Liturgy of the Word' will therefore be on **Thursday 21st March 2019** and will be led by **Y1**. We invite our Y1 families and friends to join us in the School Hall just after 9.00am.

Celebration Assembly

Our next assembly is on **Friday 1st March 2019** just after 9.00m in the School Hall and we invite the family and friends of our **Y6** pupils. This is a change from what is published in the calendar, but hopefully you will recall from the last newsletter that we had to swap the schedule around to accommodate the fact that the Y6 pupils attended 'The Big Sing' at Notre Dame Catholic High School on the last day of Term 3.

A Visit to Remember...

On Tuesday 22nd January, our Y6 pupils travelled to Beth Shalom, the National Holocaust Museum, situated near Ollerton, Nottinghamshire. As part of our World War Two topic we were investigating what life was like for different groups of people in 1930's Germany.

We followed a boy called Leo, a Jew, who lived in Berlin and learned about some of the challenges that his and other Jewish families faced during these troubled times.

At the end of the day we met a man called Simon who was a Polish Jew from an area of pre-war Poland that is now part of Belarus.

We learned that he had survived the War by hiding with his parents and brother throughout the Nazi occupation. Some pupils talked to Simon afterwards and he signed copies of his book that they bought.

This was a very reflective and interactive educational visit; allowing us to ask lots of questions and to reflect on the powerful and devastating events of this time.

Our Term 4 Learning & Sports Value

Many children think honesty simply means that you don't tell a lie. This is definitely part of what being honest means, however 'honesty' is more than just not lying. An honest person doesn't do things that are morally wrong. If something you do breaks the law or if you have to hide what you are doing because you will get into trouble, then you are probably not being honest. So honesty is about speaking and acting truthfully.



What you say...

Honesty involves speaking the truth. Saying things that aren't true (or might not be true), or that you are making up to hide the truth - are all types of lies. Lying is not honest because you are saying something that is not true.

What you do...

When you do something that you know is wrong, or when you have to hide your actions because you know they are wrong, then you are not being honest. Being honest means you act in a way that you know is right.

Being honest with yourself...

Whilst a big part of honesty is what you say and do to others another part is about being honest with yourself. If you are honest with yourself you will know why you make the decisions you make and act the way you act and whether you actually tell yourself the truth. If you need help or are unsure about something)

World Book Day 2019

This year World Book Day is on **Thursday 7th March 2018** and our theme is 'Bedtime Reading' in recognition of the fact that enjoying a book at bedtime is one of the most important things children can do every day before they go to sleep.

Dressing Up

On World Book Day all our children (and staff) are invited to come to school dressed up in pyjamas or 'onesies' and our PTFA will collect £1+ per pupil donations on the school gate which will be used to cover part of the cost of an author visit that week.

Lots of stories will be shared during the week and this year teachers will also visit another year group in order to read the class a story.

'Book in a Box'

We will also run a 'Book in a Box' competition. Children can choose one of their favourite books and then decorate a shoe-box (or any other small box) to represent it. These can be done at home and brought in and left with the children's class teachers on Thuirsday.

'Book Drive;

There will also be a 'Book Drive' actually taking place on Thursday. If possible, we would like all the children to bring a book from home that they no longer want (and that is in good condition). All the children who have brought books in will then be given the chance to pick another book that another child has brought in.

The library will also be open from 3.00pm for parents and carers to look through the books. Entry will be via the pedestrian gate, which will be supervised from that point on. Safeguarding Update: Snap Chat

This week we are looking at the global real-time photo and video sharing app, Snapchat. Snapchat averages 400 million 'snaps' a day, the minimum age to sign-up for an account is 13. <u>No</u> primary-aged pupils, including those in our school, should therefore be using Snapchat.

How does Snapchat work?

Each time a Snap is shared your child can choose how long the viewers can view it – from 1 to 10 seconds. Snaps capture a moment and aren't captured with a screenshot. If a person screenshots a Snap that has been sent to them, Snapchat will notify your child but people have found workarounds to this so please share this with your child.

Who can my child share content with on Snapchat?

Users can share content with three different audiences:

- Everyone This will mean that their content will be seen by all users.
- 'Status Message' videos and photos are only seen by added friends. Your child must actively add friends that they would like to send or receive content from.
- 'Online' This enables your child to select friends they want to block from seeing their content. By default only users your child has added to their friends list can send them content

Who can send them content?

Users can choose to receive content from either "Everyone" or "My Friends" and should be encouraged to set their default setting to only accept content from "My Friends". Tap the ghost icon > tap the gear icon > select "My Friends".

There are three sections that you should update:

- 'Contact Me'
- 'My Story'
- 'Quick Add'

The 'Quick Add' feature allows people who have a user's phone number in their contact list to add someone as a friend on the Snapchat app. This will ensure that only people users have added (or 'friended') on Snapchat can send them a photo or video.

Please note that screenshot is possible – the Snapchat platform does not support this but Apple's iOS and Google's Android smartphones do allow you to take screenshots and save them. Users should not 'screen grab' Snaps without permission from the sender.

Sharing content with real friends

Snapchat, like other social networking apps, is designed to share moments with "real life" friends but there is still the danger that children may connect with people they don't know. Users should therefore only share content with **real** friends – and even then, be careful.







Worryingly it has been reported in the wider press that 'sexting' and the sharing of inappropriate images can be an issue even among young people sadly. It is important to note that the sending of nude images of children under 18 by anyone is utterly illegal – even if it is sent by a child to a friend. Sending indecent images could therefore leave the sender, even if that sender is a child him or herself, facing serious legal repercussions.

Senders must also be aware that images can be captured, through screenshots, and then shared more widely with anyone else.



Location sharing (Snap Maps)

Snap maps enables users to share their locations with one another so their location can be seen as well as what is going on around them.

As this feature shows a user's precise location on a map users are encouraged **not** to share their location, especially with people they don't know in person.



Location settings

There are three location settings to choose from:

- 1. Ghost Mode: you are the only person who can see your location on the map. Within Ghost Mode you can still see the locations of your friends but they will be unable to see you.
- 2. My Friends: means that all of your contacts on Snapchat can see your location.
- 3. Select Friends: allows users to look through their friend list and then decide which of their friends they want to be able to view their location.

Users should only share their location with people they actually know (in person). They should never share their location with strangers.

Browsing safely

Snapchat uses Google's browsing service to warn users of suspected phishing, malware, other dangerous sites.

Managing the content your child can see on Snapchat

There are a set of community guidelines about what you can and cannot post, and you can view them here.

Delete or Block the user

When someone blocks or deletes another user that person is then not able to view or comment on any posts. People are not told when someone blocks them.

Report a Snap on 'Story Explorer'

Users who see something on 'Story Explorer' that unsettles them can press and hold on the Snap in order to report the item to the team.

Reporting content

Users who receive inappropriate images or who experiences harassment from another user can access support via this link www.snapchat.com/safety and follow the steps in order to report it to Snapchat.

Deleted account

Users can delete their account permanently via this link: Snapchat account deactivation page
